## **From the Chief of University Police:**

Thank you for taking time to read this year's Annual Campus Safety Report. This report is designed to provide you with important information about safety and security on the SUNY Delhi campus. In addition to outlining the details of the various programs the College offers to campus community members, the report also contains statistics about reportable crime on campus.

As you review the statistics, you will note that SUNY Delhi is a very safe campus. The safety you experience on campus is due in part to the combined efforts of many different departments and individuals. Safety is a shared responsibility and we rely on each and every campus community member to contribute to security and safety on campus by reporting suspicious activities and using common sense when going about their daily activities.

The University Police Department is primarily responsible for developing services, programs, and strategies for maintaining a reasonably safe campus. In order to meet this goal, the department focuses on four primary objectives:

1. Developing strong partnerships with the community.
2. Recognizing the importance of providing services that support the institutional goals of the College.
3. Being committed to the philosophy of campus and community-oriented public safety related problem solving.
4. Being involved with student groups and organizations, residence hall groups, athletic teams, and administrative offices.

While quite simplistic, this approach has become the cornerstone of our efforts to become more fully engaged with the campus community as partners in safety.

Another function of the department is our focus on the campus emergency management systems. This requires a comprehensive approach to preventing, preparing for, responding to, and recovering from emergency situations. The College has a proactive approach to planning for emergencies and these efforts are led by members of the Emergency Preparedness Task Force. The College is committed to evaluating and investing in technology which will enhance safety throughout campus. This technology includes an emergency notification system and security cameras in selected areas.

Finally, the department is charged with the enforcement of College rules and regulations, and state and local laws. This function is essential to maintaining an environment that is safe and allows our educational mission to occur without disruptions. We hope you find this report informative and helpful, and that your time at Delhi will be safe, enjoyable and a life long learning experience.

## **SUNY Delhi Campus Safety Report September 2009**

This report is filed as required by the federal "Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act," (hereinafter referred to as the Campus Safety Act). The purpose of this report is to provide our faculty, staff and students with campus safety information including crime statistics and procedures to follow to report a crime. Furthermore, compliance with the Clery Act requires institutions to develop policy statements, gather information, categorize the information, disseminate statistics and have reliable record keeping practices in place. This report is prepared by the University Police Department and the Office of Student Life. Any questions regarding this report should be directed to University Police at 607-746-4700.

### **General Security Information**

The information contained in this report is compiled from data for the calendar year 2008 (January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2008). In the spring 2008 semester there were 2432 students enrolled at SUNY Delhi, with 1460 living on campus in six residence halls. In the fall 2008 semester there were 2790 students enrolled at SUNY Delhi, with 1600 living on campus in six residence halls and off campus at the Riverview Apartment Complex. Students, faculty and staff have access to academic, recreational and administrative facilities on campus during regular hours of operation. The doors of all the residence halls are locked 24 hours a day. Catskill Hall is open to those needing to do business in the Residence Life Office, Monday through Friday, 8:30am to 4:30pm. Students are issued electronic access keys for the residence hall in which they reside. Staffs that have a need to access the residence halls (such as University Police, Maintenance staff and Residence Hall professionals) are issued card access to these buildings.

From time to time, the public is invited to attend cultural and recreational events on campus and access to the student center and other non-resident buildings is permitted during these times. Any reports of suspicious individuals should be made to the University Police Department at 4700. If off campus, individuals should call 911 to report medical or police emergencies.

The physical plant department maintains the campus buildings and grounds with a concern for safety and security. It inspects campus facilities regularly, promptly makes repairs affecting safety and security, and responds immediately to reports of potential safety and security hazards, such as broken windows and locks. If you have concerns about the physical safety of campus buildings and grounds, call the physical plant office Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., at extension 4010 or your Residence Hall Director. For emergencies that occur during non-business hours, call the University Police department.

The college campus is well lit and further lighting improvements are being made. These include placing high intensity sodium vapor lights on buildings, in parking lot areas, in areas with heavy landscaping and trees, and along pathways frequently traveled by students. In addition to a telephone line in each student's room, there are nine outdoor-blue light emergency telephones strategically located throughout the campus, which are connected directly to University Police. Additional sites are being considered for more outdoor emergency telephones.

### **SUNY Delhi University Police Department**

Campus safety and security are coordinated by the University Police Department, which has a force of ten sworn police officers with full arrest powers, two full-time clerical staff, a parking services attendant, a late night desk clerk and several temporary student clerical workers. As an armed police department, patrol members respond to all emergencies. University Police Officers receive their powers by both the New York State Criminal Procedure Law and the New York State Education Law.

State University of New York police officers must meet the highest standards in New York State for law enforcement officers. The officers have passed a basic training program administered by the State University at the New York State Police Academy in Albany or a local regional police academy, and

undergo continuous training to upgrade their skills. They conduct foot, vehicle and bicycle patrols on the campus and residence hall areas 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The objective of the University Police Department is to provide a safe environment for teaching, research and social endeavors and to protect the lives and property of the students, employees and visitors of the SUNY Delhi campus. This objective is pursued within the framework of the State University rules and regulations and all local, state and federal laws. Investigation of crimes committed on the campus fall under the jurisdiction of the University Police department. The University Police Dept. also works closely with the Delhi Village Police, Delaware County Sheriff's department, and the New York State Police and assists these outside law enforcement agencies with incidents that may occur off campus but involve campus staff or students. The College has a Memorandum of Understanding with the local Delhi Village Police to address law enforcement services, assistance, investigation and back-up in those incidents which fall in both local and campus jurisdictions.

## **Disclosure of Crime Statistics**

The University Police at SUNY Delhi prepares this report to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. Campus crime, arrest and referral statistics include those reported to the University Police, designated campus officials (including but not limited to directors, deans, department heads, designated residence life staff, judicial affairs, advisors to students/student organizations, athletic coaches), and local law enforcement agencies. Counseling, health and pastoral services staff are encouraged to inform their clients of the procedures to report crime to the University Police on a voluntary or confidential basis, should they feel it is in the best interest of the client. A procedure is in place to anonymously capture crime statistics disclosed confidentially during such a session. Each year, e-mail and campus mail notification are made to all enrolled students, faculty and staff that provides the web site address to access this report. Hard copies of the report may also be obtained at the University Police Office located in North Hall. Prospective employees may obtain a copy from Human Resources in Bush Hall and visiting or prospective students can obtain a copy of the report at Enrollment Services.

## **Crime Reporting**

All members of the campus community are urged to report criminal incidents, emergencies and suspicious activity. The on-campus emergency number is extension 4700. This number should be used for all fire, medical, safety and police emergencies. All reports are classified, logged and responded to in a timely manner. The off campus emergency number is 911. Crimes in progress and any other emergencies on campus can be reported directly by any student, faculty member, or employee to University Police by dialing 4700 from a campus telephone. The University Police can also be reached using campus emergency blue light phones. Upon receipt of the call, the University Police officers are immediately dispatched to the site of the complaint. They prepare and submit incident reports which are kept on file. Members of the campus community can also report criminal incidents to the following offices:

Please note that these offices allow victims and witnesses to report crime on a voluntary, confidential basis. Reports of this nature are filed with the University Police for informational purposes, but there is no formal investigation of the incident. Counselors and pastoral staff, who are informed by persons they are counseling of the commission of a crime, are not required to, but if the victim desires may report the

incident to the Office of Judicial Affairs or University Police on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the College's crime statistics only.

For staff and students living off campus, a listing of the local area emergency numbers appears at the end of this report.

Important notifications to the campus community can be made via the campus voice-mail, campus e-mail, hard copy flyers and posters, campus public address system and NY Alert. Should the need arise, important notices may also be sent via these systems to the campus community.

## **Confidential and Anonymous Crime Reporting**

### Confidential Reporting Procedures

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the College Judicial system or the criminal justice system, you can still make a confidential report. With your permission, the University Police department can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. With such information, University Police can keep an accurate record of the number of incidents involving students, determine where there is a pattern of crime with regard to a particular location, method, or suspect, and if necessary, alert the campus community to potential danger. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crimes statistics for the institution.

### Anonymous Crime Reporting

University Police at SUNY Delhi encourages anyone who is the victim or witness to any crime to promptly report the incident to the police. Because police reports are public records under state law, the University Police Department cannot hold reports of crime in confidence. However, individuals can make anonymous reports for purposes of inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics as identified below.

Any reports made using the tip line are totally confidential.

## **Timely Warnings**

In the event that a situation arises, either on or off campus, that, in the judgment of the College President, Chief of University Police, Vice President for Students, or the President's designee(s), constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus wide "timely warning" will be issued. The warning will be disseminated to students, faculty, and staff through the College e-mail system, and campus voice mail system. The warning will also be sent via the New York Alert system for those individuals who have signed up for the service.

Depending on the particular circumstances of the crime, the Office of University Police may also post a notice on the University Police web site at: [www.delhi.edu/campus\\_life/university\\_police/](http://www.delhi.edu/campus_life/university_police/). In such instances, a copy of the notice will be posted in each residence hall and in the Student Activities Center.

SUNY Delhi has a Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan to address contingency plans for campus emergencies. This plan includes protocols for responding to and dealing with natural disasters, chemical spills, utility failures, and fires, medical and other emergencies. Plans include guidelines for notification of the College community and evacuation of facilities.

Anyone with information warranting a timely warning should report the circumstances to the University Police office, by phone (607 746 4700) or in person at the University Police Office located in North Hall.

## **Policy on Alcohol and Drugs**

The possession, consumption, sale or transfer of alcoholic beverages by all students (regardless of age) or visitors on College or College Association property is not permitted. Exceptions to this policy apply only to academic programs and functions sanctioned by the College President. An alcohol violation is defined as

any violation of college policy or state law with respect to possession or use of alcohol including disruptive behavior that results from alcohol or drug use. Students should be aware that their presence in an area where the alcohol and/or marijuana policy is found to be in violation may be held accountable, regardless of their use.

The possession, use, sale or transfer of illegal drugs or controlled substances is prohibited on or off college property. This prohibition applies to the misuse, distribution, sale or transfer of legally obtained prescription drugs. The College will uphold laws currently in effect in New York State. A marijuana violation is defined as any violation of college policy or state law with respect to possession or use of marijuana or related paraphernalia. Such violations may include possession of small or legally defined violation amounts, the use of marijuana, or being present in a location where marijuana is found.

A full description of the college policies surrounding alcohol and other drug use may be found on pages 39 and 47 of the Student Code of Conduct located in the 2009-2010 SUNY Delhi Handbook and Planner. The only exception to the policy is for academic and social functions specifically permitted by the President of the College. Members of the college community who wish to seek assistance with an alcohol or other drug issue should contact Counseling Services, which is located in Foreman Hall. A full description of the health effects of alcohol and other drug use as well as local, state and federal penalties associated with drug trafficking and possession can be found on pages 52 through 60 of the 2009-2010 SUNY Delhi Handbook and Planner.

## **Weapons on Campus**

All weapons are prohibited on campus. Any weapon, including but not limited to, spring-fired, gas-fired, electrically-fired or explosively-fired devices or fire arms, which includes rifles, pistols, BB or Pellet guns, bows, slingshots, “stun-guns”, blow guns and/or darts, any ammunition associated with these devices (i.e. paintballs, BB’s, pellets, blow gun darts, etc.) or use of any object with intent to harm or intimidate another individual including knives and/or any similar devices.

Any knife or sharp tool used for academic purposes and kept in a residence hall must be kept secure in a locked tool box, trunk or appropriate storage unit when in the residence hall. Failure to properly secure these items as specified in section V: Prohibited Items on Campus of the Student Code of Conduct will result in the appropriate campus judicial sanction.

A full description of the college policies surrounding weapons and other prohibited items on campus may be found in the Student Code of Conduct located in the 2009-2010 SUNY Delhi Handbook and Planner on pages 39 and 40.

## **Crime Log**

University Police at Delhi maintains a daily police log written in a form that can be easily understood, recording all crimes reported to the department. The log includes the following information

- a. the nature, date, time, and general location of each crime; and
- b. the disposition of the complaint, if known.

All entries that are required shall, except where disclosure of such information is prohibited by law or such disclosure would jeopardize the confidentiality of the victim, be open to public inspection within two business days of the initial report being made to the department or a campus security authority. If there is clear and convincing evidence that the release of such information would jeopardize an ongoing criminal investigation or the safety of an individual, cause a suspect to flee or evade detection, or result in the destruction of evidence, such information may be withheld until that damage is no longer likely to occur from the release of such information.

As a service, a supplemental University Police crime log is also available on the University Police website at [http://www.delhi.edu/campus life/university police/](http://www.delhi.edu/campus%20life/university%20police/) Please note that entries or updates are generally made within two business days after the event occurs. Incidents or situations deemed to pose a threat to the campus community are logged as soon as possible. While most events are logged, the office of

the Chief of University Police, may determine that an incident be classified as "confidential" in order not to jeopardize a criminal investigation or the identity of a victim.

## **Crime Prevention Activities**

Members of the campus community are urged to secure their valuables and be aware of their surroundings. To assist in this endeavor, the University Police hold educational programs each semester on a variety of topics including personal safety awareness and security, alcohol and drug education, rape awareness/sexual assertiveness training, operation ID, silent witness program and anti-theft programs. Information on safety and security is provided on request to students and employees regularly via seminars, videos, and crime alerts, posters, brochures, and college and student publications. During orientation, programs are presented which address sexual assault, fire safety, and other personal safety topics. Students are also informed of many personal safety services available on campus, which include campus escort, rape counseling, mental health services, and emergency medical and operation identification.

Services available through the University Police department throughout the year include motorist assistance, lost and found, and assistance with class projects.

SUNY Delhi has an active Personal Safety Committee that addresses issues, concerns and projects relating to personal thought-out the campus.

It is always important to secure valuable belongings and be aware of one's surroundings. Educational programs, seminars, videos, posters, brochures, student newspapers and messages from administration are ongoing and address: personal safety issues including rape/sexual assault, substance use/abuse, importance of locking doors and windows, "buddy" system and fire and property safety .

## **Criminal Activity Off Campus**

When a SUNY Delhi student is involved in an off-campus offense, police officers may assist with the investigation in cooperation with local, state, or federal law enforcement. Village of Delhi Police work and communicate with University Police officers on any serious incidents occurring on-campus or in the immediate neighborhood and business areas surrounding campus. While the Delhi Village Police have primary jurisdiction in all areas off campus, SUNY Delhi officers can and do respond to student-related incidents that occur in close proximity to campus. SUNY Delhi officers have direct radio communications with the Delhi Village Police, Delaware County Sheriff's Department, and 911 Delaware County Dispatch to facilitate rapid response in any emergency situation.

Criminal activity at off-campus apartments or houses owned or controlled by a recognized student organization is monitored by the University Police Department in cooperation with the Village of Delhi Police department, Delaware County Sheriff's Department, and the New York State Police. These agencies may also assist the University Police with investigations as warranted. An annual request is made to Village of Delhi Police for statistics of crimes which are reported on public property immediately adjacent to campus property. If a student is involved in off-campus incident involving alcohol/drug offenses or other criminal activities, and the College is made aware, they will be referred to the campus judicial system.

## **Campus Crime Statistics**

In accordance with recent updates to the "Campus Safety Act," the following data are presented to review crime activity both on campus and on streets adjacent to campus property (public property). Reported on-campus offenses include all offenses reported on campus property and in campus buildings. A specific breakdown on offenses occurring in university owned residence halls appears under "residence halls" or "other student residences." This information is also available online at:

## **Public Property Description**

Public property includes thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities that are within the campus or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. These locations were used in preparing data

about selected crimes for the "Adjacent Public Property" section of this report. These incidents/arrests occurred on property adjacent to campus. The subjects involved in these cases may or may not have been affiliated with SUNY Delhi. As part of the Jeanne Clery Act, Colleges are required to report the above listed crime statistics that occur on property adjacent to the College campus. For example, if a local law enforcement agency stops a vehicle on a street adjacent to campus and makes an arrest for drugs that would count as a statistic for a drug arrest occurring on public property in our records.

### Hate Crimes

As required by the Campus Safety Act, SUNY Delhi is required to report hate crimes in this report. For this reporting, a hate crime occurs when a person is victimized intentionally because of his or her actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability. For 2008 there were no offenses that were classified as hate crimes.

The crimes presented are based on reports filed with the following offices: University Police, Vice President of Student Affairs of Students, Coordinator of Judicial Affairs, Director of Residence Life and Director of Athletics and other campus reporting authorities. The definitions of these offenses are defined in the "Uniform Crime Report" and the "Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act". The web address of the "Campus Awareness and Campus Security Act" appears in the appendix section of this report.

### Security in the Residence Halls

The SUNY Delhi Residence Life Department is committed to providing a safe environment in the residence halls. Students are made aware of health and safety concerns as well as tips on prevention through brochures, pamphlets, floor meetings and presentations. While there are many safeguards in place, each student must do her/his part to assure a safe and secure building by adhering to the safety-related policies and procedures. Each residence hall is supervised by a full-time professional staff Residence Hall Director.

The Hall Director is the professional staff member who lives and works in the hall. On each floor, there is a student Resident Assistant who has received extensive training in many different aspects of residence hall living. The Hall Directors and Resident Assistants undergo training in the enforcement and identification of residence hall security and safety issues. There is a Hall Director on duty for the entire campus from 5

p.m. to 7 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, and 24 hours on the weekend every day that the college is in session. Additionally, each individual residence hall office is open from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m., Sunday through Thursday, and 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights. There are also night hosts assigned to monitor access of residents and their guests in the residence halls during evening hours Thursday through Saturday nights.

Students should not assume that crime cannot occur in their seemingly safe environment. SUNY Delhi is committed to maintaining a safe environment where students, faculty and staff can work together free of all forms of harassment, violence or fear. The College judicial system is used to correct this sort of behavior, or in extreme cases, to remove the offending individual from the campus community. Any student with concerns about such behavior should contact their Residence Hall Director, University Police or the Counseling Center. Allegations will be treated very seriously and will be investigated in a timely fashion.

## **Judicial Affairs Procedures**

Procedures and possible sanctions related to on-campus discipline can be found in the Student Code of Conduct in the SUNY Delhi Handbook and Planner on pages 38 through 51. Victims of sex crimes should contact the Judicial Affairs Office at 607 746-4443 or Counseling Services at 607 746-4690 for additional information. The Student Code of Conduct, contained in the 2009-2010 SUNY Delhi Handbook and Planner, outlines the procedures that can occur if a victim decides to report an incident. It is important to note that the accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during the disciplinary hearing. Both the accuser and the accused will be informed of the outcome of any campus disciplinary action including the sanction that may have been imposed. Such sanction can include suspension or expulsion from college.

## **Sexual Crimes Information**

Rape and sexual assault, such as sexual abuse and sodomy, constitute crimes. Such behavior is prohibited by New York State law (see Article 130 of the New York State Penal Law) and section VII of the Student Code of Conduct. The College also strongly condemns sexual harassment in any form. Allegations of sexual assault or rape should be reported to the University Police Department at 607 746-4700 or 911 if off campus or Health and Counseling Services in Foreman Hall at 607 746-4690. Allegations of sexual harassment may be reported to the Affirmative Action Office. Victims of sex crimes may also report the offense to any of the offices appearing on page 4 of this report.

Allegations of sexual assault or rape occurring off campus should be reported to the Delhi Village Police at 607 746-2336 or 911. Other local agencies that may be of assistance include the Delaware County Safe Against Violence Hot Line at 1 866 457 7233 and the Mental Health Clinic at 607 865-6522. Concerns regarding sexual harassment can be discussed with the Office of Student Life at 607 746-4440 or Counseling Services in Foreman Hall at 607 746-4690. An official complaint, if desired, should be made with the University Police at 607 746 4700, Coordinator for Judicial Affairs at 607 746-4443 or the Affirmative Action Office at 607 746-4495. Efforts will be made to ensure the confidentiality of all reports, except as necessary and required to investigate the alleged offenses. College authorities may issue a safety alert to those areas of the college community affected by the crime. The issuance of this alert will depend on the particulars of the crime. Victims who provide information to University Police may choose either criminal prosecution and/or a referral to the campus judicial system. A statement of the College's Policy on sexual harassment is located on pages 43 and 44 of the 2009-2010 SUNY Delhi Handbook and Planner.

## **Sexual Assault Prevention and Response**

The University educates the student community about sexual assaults and date rape through mandatory freshman orientation each fall. The Health and Counseling Services offers sexual assault education and information programs to students and employees upon request. Literature on date rape education, risk reduction, is available through the Health and Counseling Services, University Police, Residence Life, Athletic and Student Activities offices.

If you are a victim of a sexual assault at this institution, your first priority should be to get to a place of safety. You should then obtain necessary medical treatment. The University Police Department strongly advocates that a victim of sexual assault report the incident in a timely manner. Time is a critical factor for evidence collection and preservation. An assault should be reported directly to a University officer and/or to a residence life staff member. Filing a police report with a University officer will not obligate the victim to prosecute, nor will it subject the victim to scrutiny or judgmental opinions from officers. Filing a police report will:

- ensure that a victim of sexual assault receives the necessary medical treatment and tests, at no expense to the victim
- provide the opportunity for collection of evidence helpful in prosecution if necessary, which cannot be obtained later (ideally a victim of sexual assault should not wash, douche, use the toilet, or change clothing prior to a medical/legal exam)
- assure the victim has access to free confidential counseling from counselors specifically trained in the area of sexual assault crisis intervention.

The victim of a sexual assault may choose for the investigation to be pursued through the criminal justice system and Judicial Affairs, or only the latter. A College representative will guide the victim through the available options and support the victim in his or her decision. Various counseling options are available from the College through the Student Health Center, the Campus Ministries and support services outside the College system can be obtained through the Safe Against Violence Program in Delhi.

College disciplinary proceedings, as well as special guidelines for cases involving sexual misconduct, are detailed in the Student Code of Conduct on pages 40 through 52. The Code provides, in part, that the accused and the victim will each be allowed to choose representation to accompany them throughout the hearing. Both the victim and accused will be informed of the outcome of the hearing. A student found guilty of violating the College sexual misconduct policy could be sanctioned up to and including expulsion from the College.

## **Statement of Victims' Rights**

1. Victims have the right to choose counseling and medical treatment, and to prosecute and report their case through the university judicial system and/or the off-campus court system. They also have the right to refuse all these options without reproach from any university personnel.
2. Victims have the right to be treated with dignity and seriousness by campus personnel.
3. Victims of crimes against an individual have the right to be reasonably free from intimidation and harm.
4. University personnel are encouraged to inform all victims that:
  - Victims are not responsible for crimes committed against them;
  - Victims are not negligent toward their own and thus do not assume the risk of crime;
  - Victims should always report their crime, despite the possibility of adverse publicity for the university.
5. Victims will be made aware of appropriate student services, including counseling.
6. Victims are entitled to the same support opportunities available to the accused in a campus disciplinary proceeding.
7. If the accused is prohibited from contacting the victim or entering the victim's residence, the victim will be notified that the ban is in effect.
8. Any victim who does not wish to remain in his/her present residence hall or class section may be granted a transfer to other housing or another class section if available.
9. The victim has the right to information regarding the status of his/her case.
10. The victim may also be entitled to support and compensation from the New York State Crime Victims Board. Complete information is located at:

## **Amendment to New York State's "Megan's Law"**

Effective July 1, 2002, an amendment to New York State's Sex Offender Registration Act, commonly known as "Megan's Law", directs the Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) to notify State University of New York Police Departments if a registered sex offender enrolls at or is employed by the SUNY campus. Under this law there are three levels of risk, based on an offender's risk of re-offending: Level 1 (low), Level 2 (moderate) and Level 3 (high). As a general rule, the sentencing court will determine

an offender's risk level at the time of sentence (in probation cases) or when the offender is released from custody (in jail or prison cases). All sex offenders must register annually for a period of at least 10 years. Offenders who are classified as "high risk" (Level 3) must register for life unless judicially relieved of that obligation and also must personally verify their address with local law enforcement every 90 days.

If SUNY Delhi receives notice of a Level 3 (high risk) sexual offender on campus from DCJS, the campus community will be notified that a sexual offender is on campus and the level of risk assigned to the offender by the courts. The information will be disseminated to the campus by the following means:

- e-mail notices will be sent to all students, faculty and staff
- a notice will be placed on the University Police web site

## **Sex Offender Registry Information**

In accordance to the "Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act" of 2000, the Jeanne Clery Act and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the SUNY Delhi University Police is providing a link to New York State Sex Offender Registry. This act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation, or is a student.

In the State of New York, anyone found guilty of sex crimes (such as rape, sexual abuse) must register with the Sex Offender Registry maintained by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. Unlawful use of the information for purposes of intimidating or harassing another is prohibited and willful violation shall be punishable as a Class 1 misdemeanor.

## **Missing Person Policy**

It is the policy of the University Police at Delhi to thoroughly investigate all calls of missing persons and to complete the associated reports. The aforementioned investigation will not be considered closed until significant information to the contrary of the missing person's reports is confirmed.

Jurisdictional conflicts regarding a missing person's report will be resolved in a manner avoiding conflict between investigating law enforcement agencies. The University Police Department at Delhi will share all appropriate investigative information with outside police agencies in a manner that will assist in the locating of the person reported missing.

## **Offense Definitions**

The definitions for murder, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, weapon law violations, drug abuse violations and liquor law violations are excerpted from the Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook. The definitions of forcible and non-forcible sex offenses are excerpted from the national incident-based reporting edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting handbook. ### **Robbery**

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

### **Aggravated Assault**

An unlawful attack by one person upon another which causes serious bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

**Burglary**

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes, this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempt to commit any of the aforementioned.

**Motor Vehicle Theft**

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned including joyriding.)

**Weapon Law Violations**

The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as manufacture, sale or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

**Drug Abuse Violations**

Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroine, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

**Liquor Law Violations**

The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

**Sex Offenses (Forcible)**

Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

**1. Forcible Rape**

The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

**2. Forcible Sodomy**

Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

**3. Aggravated Sexual Assault**

The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

**4. Sexual Abuse**

The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

**Sex Offenses (Non-forcible)****Unlawful, non forcible sexual intercourse.****1. Incest**

Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

**2. Statutory Rape**

Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

## Definitions That Were Added or Changed as of 1999

- A. **Arson**  
Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.
- B. **Criminal Homicide, Manslaughter by Negligence**  
The killing of another person through gross negligence.
- C. **Criminal Homicide, Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter**  
The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.
