## New Baking Lab for Delhi

Instructor **Julee Miller** says it's something to behold. With steam-injected ovens, a dough sheeter, a cryovac, and ice cream maker, SUNY Delhi's new lab is the latest in baking technology.

"In order to make a really crispy crust, you need a burst of steam at the beginning of the baking process," Instructor Miller explains. Delhi's ovens have that and more, thanks to Senator **John Bonacic** who helped the college secure \$150,000 in funding for the lab.

"The baking lab adds to the variety of coursework we can offer," says Instructor Miller. "Students who have a penchant for baking can now take new classes to en-

hance their Hospitality Management degree."

Two new electives have been added this year: "Artisanal Breads" in the fall and "Baking for Health" in the spring. The "Artisanal Breads" class is evolving according to Instructor Miller. This semester students were each assigned a different country and asked to research that country's bread. "The students came up with unusual recipes and stories," she says. "Did you know that pumpernickel is from Germany and literally means 'the devil's wind?'"

The spring class will delve into America's emerging dietary needs, such as breads that are gluten free and better for those with heart disease.

Instructor Miller says that more classes will follow as interest is identified among the Hospitality Management students and as new ideas for courses are developed.

Student **Erica Wells** loves the new oven ceramic decks in the baking lab. A ceramic deck acts like a big pizza stone and aids in uniform baking. No more wire racks, according to Wells. "Finally baking students have their own place to work. It's great to have a lab with all new equipment entirely dedicated to baking."

SUNY Delhi became a web sensation when the college entered a national video contest on YouTube sponsored by *U.S. News and World Report* in October.

Each video entry was required to be no longer than three minutes and had to answer the question,

The videos with the most creative approach and those that racked up the most hits on YouTube would be selected as finalists.

Delhi's concept featured cardboard cutouts of celebrities, such as **Tiger Woods**, **Lindsay Lohan** and **David Beckham**, who want to come to SUNY Delhi

because “Delhi Rocks!” This approach helped a small college like Delhi gather hits from fans who would watch the video just because their favorite celebrity was featured.

Of course, Delhi students, alumni, faculty, and staff were invited to view the video and cast their vote as well. The college received

many positive messages in the feedback feature of YouTube, with one viewer stating, “When I get older, I want to go to SUNY Delhi!”

Alumni also chimed in with remarks, including one who wrote, “I'm a 1976 Delhi graduate. It rocked back then and obviously it still rocks today! Great job everyone. I have fond memories of that beautiful campus. My husband and I met there, so it will always be special to us!”

Unfortunately, SUNY Delhi was not selected as a finalist, but was strongly encouraged by *U.S. News* to enter again next year. *Daily Star* reporter **Patsy Breakey**, who covered the story, shared her disappointment that the college did not make the final cut in the contest. “I think the students and advisors at SUNY Delhi deserve kudos for writing and producing an original video that followed the theme. Delhi definitely rocks more than a lot of the schools that skirted the rules,” she wrote.

Secretary II **Lucinda Brydon**, Resident Hall Directors **A.J. Cich**, **Matt Juba**, **José Sanchez**, and **Lisa Tufariello**, Assistant Professor **Dave DeForest**, Nurse Practitioner **Lynda Preiser**, Director of Academic Advisement **Jeff Stedman**, Counselor **Christian Vesterfelt**, and Assistant Director of Counseling Services **Mary Wake** guided eight groups through various low ropes elements designed to build self-esteem, promote trust, heighten cooperation in working together, downplay negative competition, and build compassion and respect for others.

Orientation leaders, resident assistants, two Hospitality Management classes, two Freshman Seminar classes, members of the women's volleyball team, and

the swimming and diving team benefitted from this specialized training.

Vice President for Student Life **Barbara Jones** says that faculty and staff should consider taking advantage of this learning opportunity. “The low ropes course is an effective, hands-on, cooperative learning tool that happens to be in very close proximity to the campus. Both the Student Life Division and the 4-H Camp Administrator would like to see more of the campus community benefit from it.” According to Vice President Jones, announcements will go out to the campus via *Delhi Today* announcing when the course will reopen during the Spring 2009 semester and others can literally “learn the ropes.”

“By coordinating requests and utilizing our own certified facilitators, we can offer valuable training and take advantage of this great, local resource,” Vice President Jones says.

At the competition, student **Sean Taylor** earned a perfect score for ice carving. Delhi students also competed in the 140th Annual *Societe Culinaire Philanthropique* in New York City. **Mike Desorcie**, **Jillian Naveh**, and **Sarah Thurgood** won gold medals, and **Kenny Liranzo** won "Best of Show." Students **Joe Michaud**, **Kate Iovino**, **Joe LaForm**, **Kenny Liranzo**, **Julie Hernandez**, and **Victoria Quimette** won silver medals.

This fall, it was good to be a Bronco. Athletics Director **Bob Backus** was named to the NJCAA Cross Country Track and Field Hall of Fame at the track nationals in Providence, Rhode Island. He also received honors as Men's National Division III Cross Country Coach of the Year. The Men's Cross Country team

won the NJCAA Division III title for the fifth consecutive year with **Chris Mason** becoming the first runner to win the national individual title two years in a row. Mason and **Chris Burke** earned First Team All-American honors. Men's Soccer finished the season with the best record in SUNY Delhi history with 14 wins, three losses, and one tie. Coach **Geoff Moore** was named Mountain Valley Conference Coach of the Year. Women's Soccer had the best record in the conference, finishing the season 5-1. **Emily Bilz** earned Second Team All-Region honors. Coach **Bob Leary** was named Mountain Valley Conference Tri-Coach of the Year. Women's Cross Country placed third at the NJCAA national competition with **Kim McKay** earning Honorable Mention All-American honors. Women's Volleyball ended the season with a five-game winning streak and **Izumi Takahashi** was named to the All-Conference team. Men's Golf won the Manhattanville/NYU Classic over nine four-year colleges.

The Tau Delta Chi fraternity was recently recognized by the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (LLS) Upstate New York/Vermont Chapter for raising \$2,008 though the fraternity's 7th Annual Softball

Tournament. LLS Executive Director **Maureen O'Brien-Thornton** wrote, "This is the biggest donation from this tournament ever. Great job!"
