A total of 2,445 students have enrolled at Delhi, the highest level since 1989. We are carving a unique niche in higher education, providing a seamless, student-centered, technology-based education from the certificate through associate and bachelor's degrees. Yes, Delhi now offers 10 baccalaureate programs and most are unique within SUNY and New York State. We are also building new facilities and improving current ones. 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Enhancing Academic Excellence

SUNY Delhi is uniquely qualified to become New York's leader in offering a seamless, student-centered approach to technology education—from certificate programs to associate and baccalaureate degrees. Over the past year, major strides have been made toward achieving that goal, and many of those accomplishments have earned recognition at the state, regional and national levels.

Heading the list was Middle States Commission on Higher Education, which reaffirmed the quality education SUNY Delhi provides students by reaccrediting the college for 10 years. This is the maximum period for which a college can receive accreditation, and it followed an intensive two-year self-study by the college to assess its strengths and opportunities for improvement. Delhi also met rigorous standards for selectivity and general education as set by the State University. The college's Memorandum of Understanding with

SUNY outlines Delhi's commitment to increase selectivity, particularly at the baccalaureate degree level. For Fall 2002, 24 percent of the applicants did not meet enrollment standards. This represents an 8 percent increase in selectivity, compared to Fall 2000.

The college put a program in place to assess students' competencies in 12 general education areas as set by the State University Board of Trustees.

Additional academic achievements of note were:

New Academic Programs—Six new programs were introduced.

- The "Partnership for Nursing Opportunities" linked Delhi's nursing programs with Hartwick College and Bassett Hospital to guarantee graduates jobs and the opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree for the cost of one year at Delhi.
- The Western Hospitality Institute in Jamaica and SUNY Delhi forged an agreement that allows WHI students to complete the final year of a baccalaureate program in Hospitality Management at Delhi.
- Associate degree options in welding technology and an associate of applied science option in electrical construction, instrumentation and controls received State Education Department approval.
- Credit for Life, a partnership with the New York State Turfgrass Association to give green industry professionals college credit for their on-the-job experience, was launched to an enthusiastic audience at NYSTA's annual Turf and Grounds Exposition.

New Programs on the Horizon—

Program proposals for five new degree programs were developed:

- Bachelor of technology degree in architectural technology
- Bachelor of business administration degree in veterinary science technology
- Bachelor of business administration degree in sports area and recreation facility management were submitted to the State University
- Certificate and associate degree in Maintenance Mechanic Technology

Resnick Library Renovation—A \$1 million renovation, which transformed the Resnick Library into a comprehensive learning center, was completed. The project was funded by \$150,000 in private donations, which leveraged \$850,000 in support from SUNY. The

final result brings together traditional library and academic support services under one roof.

Student Achievement—Delhi students earned state and national honors for excellence.

- The culinary team captured the American Culinary Federation's New York State Championship for the third straight year.
- More than 90 percent of Delhi students passed registered nurse and veterinary lab technician licensure exams.
- Applied technology students advanced to the Vocational Industrial Clubs of America national finals.
- Delhi's Phi Theta Kappa Chapter was ranked second in New York State and earned a scholarship to the PTK Honors Institute.
- Two students were selected recipients of State University Chancellor's Awards for Excellence.

New Courses—Students were offered more chances to pursue special topics, thanks to the introduction of courses in sculpturing for culinary, veterinary science electives, Microsoft certification, Race in America, and UNIV 103: Information Management.

New Instructional Techniques—WebCT has spurred the college's first on-line baccalaureate degree in Hospitality

Management. WebCT is an on-line course management system that offers a wide range of tools that allow students to learn via the Internet.

Student Schedules—A review of the curriculum, new courses and strong academic advising increased the average course load for full-time students to 15.9 credit hours per semester, compared to 13 per semester in Fall 2000. This new emphasis on credit load increases the ability of students to graduate on time.

Faculty Writing and Research—The number of creative works in print by Delhi faculty and staff continues to grow. Assistant Professor Kirby Olsen's Gregory Corso: Doubting Thomist was published by the Southern Illinois University Press. Associate Professor Lynn Domina's poem, "The Museum of the Living and the Dead" appeared in The Christian Century. Assistant Professor Linnea Goodwin Burwood wrote three entries for the Encyclopedia of American Social Movements. Associate Professor Kathryn DeZur's book review of Katherine Eggert's Showing Like a Queen: Female Authority and Literary Experiment in Spenser, Shakespeare, and Milton (University of Pennsylvania Press, 2000) will appear in Clio: A

Journal of Literature, History, and the Philosophy of History.

Meeting/Exceeding Enrollment Goals

Five consecutive semesters of enrollment increases have helped make Delhi one of the State University's great success stories, and put the college on its way toward meeting its objective of sustained overall growth in both full- and part-time students. With 2,405 students in Fall 2002, enrollment has reached its highest level since 1989. Factors contributing to Delhi's strong enrollment position include:

Bachelor's Degrees—A total of 205 students enrolled in baccalaureate degree programs in Delhi this fall, which represents a 189 percent increase over the past two years.

Nursing—Partnerships, Weekend College and special recruitment initiatives combined to help Delhi meet a regional need for trained nurses. First-time students enrolling in nursing programs increased from 35 in Fall 2001 to 102 this year, pushing total enrollment in nursing programs to 194 students. Key projects included: the Partnership for Nursing Opportunities with Bassett Healthcare and Hartwick College; "Stay Close...Go Far," a joint marketing initiative developed with the Delaware County Rural Healthcare Alliance; the launch of a new class of students in Weekend College; and the delivery of classes at Fox Hospital in Oneonta and the Robinson Terrace Nursing Home in Stamford.

International Students—Agreements with the Western Hospitality Institute in Jamaica and Human International University in Japan helped attract 36 international students to Delhi this fall.

Retention—Students are obviously pleased with their Delhi experience. Returning student enrollment increased 11 percent this fall compared to last year.

Outreach—Delhi is meeting the need for baccalaureate-level hospitality education in the Capital District by offering courses at Schenectady County Community College. Delhi also introduced associate level courses, geared to working adults, at The Telecenter in downtown Oneonta.

Flexible Housing—A close analysis of residence hall space allowed the expansion of housing options and pushed residence hall capacity to 110 percent.

New Housing—The Binghamton-based architectural firm of Bearsch-Compeau-Knudson was selected to design a new 150-bed suite-style residence hall. Plans call for the hall to be ready for Fall 2004.

Summer School—Introduction to Fiction was offered on-line last summer, helping deliver a Delhi education to a broader audience. Thanks to the success of this course, more on-line summer courses are planned.

Special Programs—The APEX High School Enrichment program, funded by a grant from Senator John Bonacic, and Skills USA provide unique learning opportunities and also help introduce the college to prospective students.

The Web—Students are increasingly turning to the web for their college information, and design and content changes to Delhi's web site made it more accessible and user-friendly for prospects.

college makes to students and parents. The strong increase in returning students is a prime example that retention efforts are working. Keys to retention success introduced this past year include:

RetentionTRAX—Delhi was selected by Noel-Levitz, the nation's premier consulting firm for enrollment and retention, as one of six pilot sites in the nation to introduce this new student retention software. TRAX software brings student information from various campus offices together in a single, centralized data source so faculty and advisors can communicate with students, respond to their needs and keep them up to date on their academic performance.

Freshman Seminar—This class, used throughout the nation to boost academic performance, was expanded to reach more students. Assessment indicates that students who are enrolled in this course tend to have better grades, are more likely to be retained, and complete more credit hours.

UNIV 095: College Survival Course—This course for students on academic probation helps them develop the skills they need to succeed.

Retention Advisory Council—A specially designed semester of courses that challenge and provide assistance to students with academic problems was developed by this new campus group.

Increasing Retention

Providing students with the support they need to succeed is a commitment the

CADI Scholarships—A new scholarship program, funded by the college's auxiliary services corporation, made \$16,000 available to students who are have made positive contributions to campus life and are continuing their educations at Delhi.

New Living-Learning Community—Nursing students became the latest group to benefit from the living-learning environment that offers students tutoring, mentoring and classes in the residence halls.

EOP Initiatives—Performance Plus contracts offered a one-on-one approach to helping Educational Opportunity Program students on

academic probation succeed academically. Academic Achievement Awards were also introduced to foster pride among the EOP students, recognizing and rewarding the best and the brightest enrolled in this program.

Residence Hall Improvements—Over \$125,000 in new furnishings were added and improvements were made to the residence halls. Many rooms were updated with window screens and door viewers, as well as a fresh coat of paint, and a new roof was installed on Russell Hall.

Transcripts—A co-curricular transcript, developed to document a student's campus leadership and levels of involvement with campus organizations, has spurred student involvement and helps demonstrate initiative to prospective employers. A GenEd transcript was created for students who continue their educations in the SUNY system so that they may be given credit for meeting general education student learning objectives.

Peer Mentors—A special feature of living-learning communities, peer mentors serve a leadership role designed to assist other students who are from the same academic program. They are easily accessible, living in the same communities where they tutor their fellow students. Peer mentors also offer workshops and programming relative to their academic community.

Family Day and Homecoming—Family Day has become one of the biggest programs on campus, drawing over 1,000 people each fall. The surge in activities led the Alumni Office to offer its first Homecoming event in conjunction with Family Day.

Program Analysis—A study of the Individual Studies major demonstrated that the program provides a vital service by providing students who wish to change their major to pursue

other academic areas of interest at Delhi.

Enriching Campus Life

A key element of a student-centered education is providing students with educational and social opportunities on both sides of the classroom door. SUNY Delhi excels in this area, which explains why the demand for on-campus housing is the highest in the college's history. The Delhi approach also gets students involved. More than 65 percent of all Delhi students participate in a student organization or activity, a level that ranks among the best in the State University system.

Investments in technology and facilities stand out as prime examples of the college's on-going commitment to enriching student life. Wireless internet connectivity for students in the residence halls was introduced and demand has soared. Delhi's Computer Technology Center also continues to be a hub for campus activity, providing specialized academic and recreational computing labs for students.

Delhi has also put its energies and dollars into improving and expanding campus facilities. After the college's old air structure collapsed this past winter, special state support was leveraged to install a new facility that now supports intramurals, intercollegiate athletics, and the new Professional Golf Management program.

New sidewalks, which are ADA compliant, greatly improved access and safety for students. An atrium-style glass enclosure added to the Farrell Hall Café has created better ambiance and service in this popular dining spot. Plans also moved forward for a new sports complex and a residence hall.

Further proof that campus life at Delhi has a winning edge include:

Athletic Success—SUNY Delhi is a national force on the athletic scene. Highlights from the 2001-2002 season included:

- Men's Cross-Country was named team of the decade in Division III by the National Junior College Athletic Association.
- Four Delhi athletes were crowned national champions at the NJCAA Division III Outdoor Track and Field Championships.
- The men's basketball team was ranked number one in the final NJCAA regular season poll and went on to finish fourth at the national tournament, equaling the highest finish in college history.
- Men's lacrosse capped its most successful season in Delhi history by finishing sixth in the final national poll, and the NJCAA naming Coach Kevin Gates "National Coach of the Year."
- The NJCAA selected Delhi to host three national championships in 2002-2003—cross-country, men's basketball, and outdoor track.
- Delhi's athletics program ranked fourth out of 32 schools in NJCAA Sears Cup standings.

Residence Hall Security— Safety is a key concern for students and their parents and the college continues to make improvements with that in mind.

The night host system, which requires students and approved guests to register when they enter the residence halls late at night, was re-introduced during the Spring 2002 semester. New front entrance doors, compete with card access and lobby telephones, were also installed.

Student Activities—Delhi's student activities program is a model for other campuses. New programs introduced this past year include:

- Martin Luther King, Jr. Day—Special recognition of students, faculty and staff who embody the teachings of Dr. King and a keynote address by Gretchen Sullivan Sorin, director/professor of the Cooperstown Graduate Program in history museum studies, celebrated the spirit of this American hero.
- Student Leadership Conference—Nationally recognized motivational speaker Harvey Alston highlighted a series of workshops designed to enhance the leadership skills of Delhi students.

- Multicultural Fest—Over 300 students, faculty and staff enjoyed learning about the rich cultural heritage that exists on the Delhi campus.
- Nursing Department Culture Fest—Held in conjunction with the Nursing Through the Life Spans classes, students researched several ethnic groups and made presentations on health practices of other countries.
- Snow Ball—This semi-formal "wrap up" to the fall semester gives students the opportunity to step out on the town for an evening.
- Gospel Choir—A new musical group was formed at the request of students, and now performs on and off campus.

Counseling and Health Services—

Outreach programs offered included National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week, Safe Spring Break Week, Stress Reduction, Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Awareness, and World AIDS Day.

Erpf-Sanford Lecture Series—The series, funded by a special endowment, brings authors, poets and experts to Delhi to share their knowledge with the campus and local community.

Satellite Seminars—Phi Theta Kappa, Delhi's national honor society chapter, brought three seminars on "Customs, Traditions, and Celebrations: The Human Drive for Community," via satellite to the campus.

Securing Additional Resources

State and federal grants, combined with tremendous generosity from alumni and friends, have helped stretch Delhi's

dollars. A \$200,000 Housing and Urban Development grant is paving the way for Delhi's first on-line degree—a bachelor's in hospitality management. Federal support through the AmeriCorps program continues to fund the Catskill Outdoor Education Corps, which provides vital services to community organizations and enhances the college's park and recreation programs. A \$100,000 Tech Prep planning grant awarded to SUNY Delhi was one of only seven of its kind funded by the State Education Department. Additional resources were also sought and secured; here are some of the highlights:

Assistance Technology Grant—Premier Programming of Michigan approved a \$25,000 proposal to aid students with disabilities.

Boehringer Ingelheim Pharmaceutical—This pharmaceutical corporation is providing \$30,000 over a three-year period to create unique research assistantships for Veterinary Science Technology majors.

Donations on the Rise—Contributions from alumni and friends to support student scholarships and special projects, such as peer tutoring, rose 32 percent, making the average gift \$77.

Special State Grants—Grants awarded by Senator John Bonacic brought \$230,000 to the campus to support the APEX high school enrichment program, much-needed technology equipment, and golf course improvements.

Catskill Watershed Corporation—This corporation issued a \$10,000 grant to support the feasibility study for the "Pharm" an entrepreneurial venture that has the potential to link the college and local farmers with the biomedical research community.

Industry Support—Over \$22,000 was generated for the golf/turf programs.

Hospitality Endowment—The Kevin Zraly Scholarship Endowment benefited from "Pride of New York,"

a fund-raising dinner celebrating the best of products produced in the Empire State.

Educational Opportunities Program Support—EOP received \$22,000 from SUNY's Office of Special Programs for its Living/Learning Community.

Financial Aid Assistance—Delhi's financial aid experts converted a portion of work-study money into Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants (SEOG) to assist students in meeting their bill at the college. This effectively reduced or removed students' Stafford loan balances. The Financial Aid Office also secured an additional \$100,000 in Perkins Loan money to award deserving students.

Summer Conferences—This initiative generated \$57,000 in revenue for the college.

Corporate Services—Custom-designed programs offered at the local and state levels generated significant revenues to support academic programs and other special initiatives at the college.

The College Association at Delhi Inc.—This campus auxiliary service corporation netted a profit of \$157,632, which allowed it to expand the campus services it supports.

Major Gifts Program—A new program was introduced by the College

Advancement Office in an effort to target donations from high-end donors.

Conserving Resources

All state agencies, including SUNY, were asked to help solve New York's fiscal problems. At Delhi, that meant a \$550,000 budget shortfall in the final analysis. The college community joined forces to tackle the challenge. The College Senate, Delhi's governance organization, formed an ad hoc group to provide campus-wide input to the President's Cabinet. Major features of the final plan included not filling vacancies, offering faculty and staff the opportunity to take reduced contracts, canceling a major web redesign project, forming committees to recommend efficient use of paper, and encouraging faculty and staff to make donations to the college.

Additional conservation steps taken this past year included:

Energy Conversion—An Energy Performance Contract was negotiated through the New York State EnVest program to convert three major campus buildings from electric heat to

fossil fuel hot water heating systems, saving a minimum of \$411,000 a year. **Database Administration**—The college contracted with two SUNY-affiliated organizations—Student Information and Campus Administrative Systems (SICAS) and Information Technology Exchange Center (ITEC)—to support its database administration functions.

Campus Information Center—Cross-training staff improved efficiency and customer service at this one-stop information center.

On-line Publications—Two major campus newsletters, Delhi Weekly and Delhi Update, were converted to electronic publications and placed on the web, saving \$2,500 annually.

Salary Support—Direct support from the College Foundation allowed the college to hire an experienced annual fund coordinator.

Freshman Seminar Instructors—Members of the President's Cabinet and staff from Student Life volunteered to teach the Freshman Seminar courses.

Implementing a Planning Process Across Campus

Planning was a major point of emphasis highlighted by the Middle States Accreditation team in its final report, and the college had already taken steps to address that concern by the time the report arrived on campus. The success of the initial ad hoc planning and budget group helped make it a permanent part of the budgeting process. The College Senate, Delhi's governance organization, has taken leadership of the planning and budget group, and formed a committee that is meeting with each department and academic division to prioritize the needs of the college.

Other planning implementation for the year included:

Academic Program Assessment—

Enrollment, market niche, and the cost of each academic program are assessed annually to determine programs that need special attention. Marketing and other initiatives are then developed to strengthen the programs.

Tech Advice—An independent team of technology consultants from across the State University system conducted a thorough evaluation of Campus Information Systems. The team's final report led to new priorities and others changes within CIS.

Credit Hour Assessment—Enrollment Services created systems to help inform faculty and academic deans about students who have not registered for classes or student credit loads that are incongruent with previous semester loads.

Advisory Councils—Academic program advisory councils brought industry experts to the campus to review the curricula and ensure a Delhi education keeps pace with the changing employment needs.

Academic Assessment—Assessment process for academic majors has been revised and approved by the SUNY Provost. Objectives for all academic programs are now listed in the College Catalog. An assessment of general education began this year, and the complete plan will be sent to the Provost's Office for review.

Team Approach—Student behavior, counseling cases, and safety issues are now managed proactively on a weekly basis through a new campus committee led by the dean of Student Life, and includes the directors of University Police, Residence Life, Counseling and Health, Student Activities and Judicial Affairs.

Crisis Response—A total revision of the college crisis response plan was completed. It outlines a plan of action so that campus emergencies can be handled and managed in a timely and logical manner.

Fostering a Sense of Community

A sense of community is essential to creating a college that is vibrant, healthy and resourceful. Promoting open communication, working together as a team, and celebrating success are part of the Delhi approach. Here is a close-up look at some of the details:

Construction Projects—Constructing a health center at 4-H Camp Shankitunk and planting trees for the Delhi Beautification committee are examples of how hands-on projects enhance the educational experience for students and make our communities a better place to live.

Honorary Doctorate—Scott Clark, an innovator in sports facility construction and a long-time friend of SUNY Delhi, became the second recipient of an honorary doctorate from the college when he was presented with a doctor of humane letters degree at commencement.

Hospitality Requirement—Students enrolled in Delhi’s hospitality management baccalaureate programs must complete a minimum of 10 hours of community service to fulfill their degree.

Ice Sculptures—Faculty and students created ice sculptures at the Hanford Mills Museum Winter Ice Harvest.

O’Connor Center for Community Service—Students, faculty and staff contributed over 5,200 hours of volunteer service through the O’Connor Center. Community response has been so positive to this project that the Hobart-based O’Connor Foundation made a multi-year commitment to fund the center.

Leadership Awards—Twenty students and two faculty members were recognized for their outstanding contributions to improving the quality of campus life through this new recognition program developed by Student Life.

The National Coalition Building Institute Campus Team—This group of committed students, faculty and staff was formed to eliminate prejudice and inter-group conflict on the Delhi campus.

Alumni Reunion—Participation at Reunion 2002 increased by 43 percent. At the event, Mark Grillo, a 1998 electrical technology alumnus, was recognized for his heroic acts as a New York City Police officer on September 11, 2001.

Computer Experts—Two specialized groups for users of Banner, the campus-wide database system, were formed to strengthen and improve use of the system.

Giving Thanks—More than 100 SUNY Delhi employees who are also Delhi alumni were recognized with pumpkin pies, hand-delivered by the College Advancement staff during Thanksgiving week.

Bullish on Business—President Candace Vancko, who was named “Business Advocate of the Year” by the Delaware County Chamber of Commerce, accepted the award on behalf of the faculty, staff and students. It is thanks to the efforts of Delhi’s faculty, staff and students that the college and local business leaders have been able to form partnerships that have had produced direct economic benefits for local communities.

Shawn Hafele came to Delhi's Hospitality Management program from nearby Deposit, NY, hoping his college degree would take him far. But thanks to the generosity of Delhi alumnus Jack Kennedy '64, Shawn realized his dream even sooner.

The 2002 recipient of the <KENNEDY AWARD>, Shawn spent an all-expense-paid internship last summer in the in the Florida Keys at he Cheeca Lodge and Spa in Isalморada—a location as exclusive as a Hamptons country club with a dash of “barefoot elegance” thrown in.

The trip isn't entirely for pleasure. Dean Higgins stresses that recipients of the Kennedy Scholarship serve a one-week internship at their travel destination where they learn the ins and outs of hospitality



in a real-world setting. A Culinary Arts major, Shawn wanted to learn all he could about hotels, and opted for an overview of the resort's operations. “My goal is to work in the kitchen of a resort like the Cheeca Lodge someday, so I thought I should learn about the total package,” Shawn explains.

Jack Kennedy feels privileged to enlighten students like Shawn who show determination and creativity. “It's an opportunity for them to travel and see first-hand the operations of hotels around the world. It's something that they might never get a chance to do otherwise,” says Kennedy, who is general manager of the Villa Roma Resort in upstate New York. Kennedy has also held positions with the Winthrop Hotel Group, Intercontinental Airlines, and Cunard Hotels and Resorts. “I always believe in life that you have to give back to others a measure of your success.”

On the Right Path

It's not uncommon for students who have already obtained a two- or a four-year degree to come to Delhi for a second degree. Many change their minds about what it is they want to do and decide to embark on a different path. Christine Peterson, a second-year Veterinary Science Technology major found herself in that very predicament.

"My previous degree wasn't leading me to a solid career," says Christine. "I heard about Delhi and decided to go back to school to become a veterinary technician." At Delhi, she's gained the education she wanted and much more. Christine is one of the first recipients of a special research experience funded by Boehringer Ingelheim, an internationally-based pharmaceutical company.

Boehringer Ingelheim has a long history with Delhi—hiring graduates from the college's Veterinary Science Technology program since the 1980's—and regularly provides Delhi students with specialized internships that allow them to explore the world of research. "It's an honor knowing that the faculty think that much of my work to select me. I know that they looked at my grades and how committed I was in caring for the animals during my internship," she says. "But it's Boehringer Ingelheim that's made it all happen.
