Greater than the Sum of its Parts

A one million dollar renovation has allowed SUNY Delhi to transform Resnick Library into a one-stop learning center for its students, bringing the college's library functions together with its academic support services

"Our vision was to create a comprehensive learning resource center to

better serve our students' academic needs," says President Candace S.

Vancko. "And it was a public-private partnership that made it possible."

Lead gifts from Louis and Mildred Resnick and their family helped SUNY Delhi raise \$150,000 toward the project. That support leveraged another \$850,000 from the SUNY capital fund to complete the vision.

The facility houses the college library, the Educational

Opportunity Program, academic advisement and career services, along with services for students with disabilities, developmental centers for writing and math, tutoring and testing services, and the college's program for non-native speaking students.

In addition to these combined services, the new learning center houses print and digital media, access to multimedia labs, a wireless network, laptop computer stations, and networked classrooms to enhance the student learning experience. Specialized book collections are available, making it easier for students to conduct research within their major.

The family was honored at the event by President Vancko and Library Director Pam Peters for providing the lead gift in funding the renovation.

Marriott Makeover

Marriott has lent a helping hand to the students of SUNY Delhi's Hospitality Management program by subsidizing a major renovation of the program's model hotel suite.

Delhi's Marriott Suite was originally created in 1987 as part of a larger construction project that converted the campus dining hall into the Alumni Hall Hospitality Center. Since then, the suite has served as a learning tool for students majoring in Hotel and Resort Management. However, the years were starting to take their toll on the suite and the college knew students would be loosing out if renovations weren't made soon. That's when alumnus Tom Walsh '88, Director of Hotel Sales at the Westchester Marriott, stepped into the picture.

"I met Tom two years ago at the reception for hospitality graduates the college hosts each year in New York City," says

President Candace S. Vancko. "He told me that if he could ever help Delhi, to let him know."

It didn't take long for the President to take him up on his offer. Two months later, the college had a commitment from Marriott—the corporation would complete an overhaul of the suite.

At an unveiling of the new suite, Marriott representative Stacey Veden was there to give SUNY Delhi's hospitality programs the corporation's stamp of approval.

"The Marriott Suite is one of the reasons our hotel program is so strong," says Rosalie

Higgins, Dean of Business and Hospitality Management. "We're able to offer students the most comprehensive experience they can get in hotel room planning and operation. Thanks to Marriott, Delhi has a showcase facility that makes our hospitality programs unique."

eBay Fundraising

Scholarship opportunities for students will be increasing thanks to two successful fundraisers sponsored on eBay, the country's most popular auction website.

The events, which raised over \$3,500 for the college scholarship endowment, offered an all-inclusive vacation for two to Sunset Beach Resort & Spa on Montego Bay, and a trip for two to the exclusive Half Moon resort. The auctions were launched by an email sent to alumni, faculty and staff, prompting them to log onto eBay and bid on a trip to Jamaica.

According to Joel Smith, College Foundation Executive Director, the money raised was pure profit. "The two trips were donated through a partnership with Jamaica's Western Hospitality Institute and little effort was needed to advertise the event, so there were no overhead costs."

Golf Hype

Two top golf publications recently featured SUNY Delhi's golf course as a living laboratory that's a great place to learn and play.

The 2003 issue of *New York Golf*, New York State's number one golf



magazine, outlined the college's two- and four-year programs as well as the course and its history. *Links*, a national golf magazine, named the Delhi College Golf Course a destination not to be missed. The article touted the course's affordability while highlighting its value as a

classroom for students in Delhi's Golf and Turf Management programs.

Alumni also made the pages of a national publication. Turf Management alumni Patrick Blum '89 and Rick Holfoth '88 were featured in *Golf Course Management* magazine. Colonial Acres Golf Course, the course where Blum serves as superintendent, was selected as the magazine's choice for National Public Course and Overall Winner of the 2002 Environmental Leaders in Golf Awards. The magazine highlighted Holfoth who, in his previous position as superintendent at the Irondequoit Country Club, implemented a state-of-the-art irrigation system with the help of his staff. Holfoth is currently serving as superintendent of the Country Club of Rochester.

Solid Gold

SUNY Delhi's culinary team won a gold medal at the American Culinary Federation's National Student Team Championship held in Washington D.C. on July 25-29.

The Delhi team placed second by the narrowest of margins to Schoolcraft College of Livonia, Michigan, which also won a gold in the overall competition.

"It's very rare for two gold medals to be awarded at a national competition such as this," says Chef Tom Recinella, culinary coach, who explains

that more than one gold medal may be awarded if the teams are deserving of the honor.

The college's culinary team reached the nationals once before, in 2001, placing second with a silver medal. SUNY Delhi has the distinction of being the only New York State student team ever to win the ACF Northeastern Regional Championship in the 14-year history of the event.

Presidential Honors

President Candace S. Vancko is encouraging the best and brightest high school seniors from the region to attend their neighborhood college.

There's been an overwhelming response to an initiative known as the Presidential Scholars Program, which will provide nine deserving students who live within Delaware and Otsego Counties free tuition this fall. "I was extremely impressed by the caliber of students who were recommended for this honor," says President Vancko. "The students selected for the program finished their senior year with a cumulative average of 91 percent."

The college asked local superintendents to make recommendations based on the program's criteria. To be considered,

students must rank within the top 25 percent of their graduating class and earn a Regents Diploma with a minimum grade point average of 85 percent.

Presidential scholars will enter SUNY Delhi's honors program upon enrollment. The college's honors program is designed for those who seek a greater academic challenge given their academic ability and personal motivation.

Honor Society Emerges

SUNY Delhi recently established a campus chapter of Chi Alpha Epsilon, a national honor society that recognizes the achievements of students who enter college through academic development programs, such as Delhi's Educational Opportunity Program.

In a ceremony held during the spring semester, 14 of Delhi's EOP students were inducted into Chi Alpha Epsilon.

EOP Counselor Jeff Stedman serves as the chapter advisor and says EOP students face serious challenges because they often lack the resources that are available to other students. "And the incredible thing is that these students have proven themselves academically." Stedman sees the new addition as a way to properly recognize Delhi's top EOP students while giving others the incentive to achieve.

Sports Shorts

SUNY Delhi's Men's Golf team reached a significant milestone, winning the Elmira College Invitational in its first year competing at the four-year college level.

Vernon Gorgrant won as Region X medalist and went on to compete at the NAIA 2003 Men's Golf Championship in Palm Coast, Florida as an individual qualifier. The Women's Golf team finished third at the NAIA Region IX Championships in Brecksville, Ohio, with Danielle Rotondo tying for second place.

SUNY Delhi's new track was the site of the NJCAA Men's and Women's Outdoor Track Championship May 8-10. At the event, the Men's team placed second and the Women's team placed fourth in the nation. Eleven Delhi athletes earned All-American honors at the meet. The Men's Tennis team won

the regionals for the third consecutive year, qualifying for the NJCAA Men's Division III Tennis National Championship in Plano, Texas. There, Mark Andrews placed second in the singles competition, with the SUNY Delhi team finishing seventh.

Bachelor Degree Leads New Programs

Long recognized as the preeminent program of its kind in the nation, SUNY Delhi's Veterinary Science Technology program will launch a bachelor's degree major in the fall semester of 2004.

"The new four-year degree will position us well for the future," says Dennis Callas, Vice President for Academic Programs and Services. "It will allow us to draw better prepared students to the program, meet industry needs, and bring us one step closer to having a seamless curriculum of one-, two- and four-year programs in Veterinary Science Technology."

SUNY Delhi began its two-year degree program in Veterinary Science Technology in 1961—unchartered ground at the time. Since then, the program has earned consistent praise and ranks as the best program of its kind in the U.S. A recent external panel review by Cornell representatives revealed

that Delhi had, in their opinion, not only a national reputation, but an international one.

In addition to the new bachelor's degree, the college also received approval for an associate's degree and a one-year certificate in Maintenance Mechanic Technology. This program is designed specifically for individuals who are employed full-time as industrial maintenance mechanics, building maintenance mechanics or in a related field, and who can't attend regular, daytime classes. The program will be available in

an "online weekend" format that will accommodate the busy schedules of working adults.

Looking further ahead, the college is seeking to establish a bachelor's degree program which will allow students from the Capital Region to pursue Delhi's Hospitality Management bachelor's degree in Schenectady. This action was taken after a survey showed strong interest in SUNY Delhi expanding its two-year courses in Hospitality Management, which are offered on the Schenectady County

Community College campus. Approval for the program has been received from the State University, and is currently being reviewed by the State Education Department.
