Student Opportunity

- Julio Chavez competed and won the ACF Northeast Regional Student Chef of the Year
 Competition at the New York Culinary Institute at Monroe College in January. Special thanks to
 Sean Pehrsson who served as Julio's coach and to Victor Sommo and James Margiotta for their
 assistance with preparing for the competition. He will now be competing at the ACF National
 Convention and Show in New Orleans, LA in July.
- The Bronco Investment Group (BIG) organized the annual Casino Night in February. This year the group collaborated with the Delhi Computer Club, WDTU, and Step It Up. More than a one hundred students gambled to win raffle tickets to a drawing for a large screen LED TV, a Keurig Coffee Machine and a waterproof blue tooth enabled portable speaker. The success of this and prior events convinced the Student Activities Office to make Casino Night an official part of Winterfest. More than 85 guests played UNO, black jack, poker, roulette, and video games from the Computer Club's Library. The Bronco Investment Group's six members in attendance organized 11 student volunteers to set up the Casino in the Farrell Loft, to serve food and drink, host the event and leave the loft cleaner than when they arrived.
- The Introduction to Casino Operations class attended a field trip at the Saratoga Casino and Hotel in March. Mr. Skip Carlson, Director of Public Relations was the host, and he gave us a tour of the hotel, event space, recreational area, and Morton's Restaurant. The class stayed and were treated to dinner and also had the opportunity to watch a couple of horse races.
- Mike Barnes organized a field trip to Turning Stone Casino where students were given a tour by John Julien, Senior Director of Guest Relations. The group saw the steakhouse, nightclubs, three other restaurants, and the gaming floor. They also went to Point Place, Turning Stone's newest casino that opened March 1, 2018. There they had a tour and were treated to a wonderful lunch.
- The Bronco Investment Group (BIG) is planning a Bingo Night, a Financial Literacy Program to benefit our fellow students, and will join other clubs on a trip to job fairs in Albany and New York City later this semester. They have lined up speakers for this year including a licensed investment advisor, a residential real estate investor, and an accredited investor. Programs have covered mutual fund investment, indexed funds and ETF, as well as individual stock investments.
- Faculty and students from the Banquet Event Operations course hosted the Annual Etiquette Dinner in February. The facilitator was Frederic B. Mayo, MBA, PhD, CHE, CHT- Principal, Mayo Consulting Service and Clinical Professor of Hospitality and Tourism Management from New York University. He is also Author of "Modern American Manners: Dining Etiquette for Hosts and Guests."
- The number and quality of PGM internship opportunities for students is overwhelming, indicating a great need for interns and entry level employees in the golf industry. Golf Professionals and golf course General Managers contact the program regularly looking for staff assistants. Three different facilities physically visited campus recently to recruit PGM students.
- Sean Pehrsson hosted two separate field trips in February. First was to the Anchor Bar in Buffalo (arguably the creator of Buffalo wings) and Wegmans Food Center in Rochester. Both locations provided detailed tours and tastings for culinary students.
- Students have participated in Delhi Decision Days. Current pre-licensure students demonstrated the simulation manikins and answered questions regarding the program.

- All 2nd Year Nursing students attended a Career Panel/Nurse Leadership event held in Contemporary Nursing. Students made connections with area hospitals and healthcare facilities regarding employment post-graduation.
- MS Students presented at a Chi Tau Coffee Chat about their experiences with RAM (Remote Area Medical) in part for their practicum requirements.
- The library offered 67 instruction sessions in the fall semester; another 24 have been scheduled so far for the spring semester. These numbers are up from previous years, and we have had several faculty request instruction who are new to the institution.
- The library has begun placing new and updated private study spaces on the 2nd and 3rd floors in response to student feedback. Additional stations will be in place before the end of the spring semester.
- The library hosted a display of the winning posters from the fall Student Achievement Day, and it is currently hosting a display of the photographs and drawings made by Architecture students on their study abroad trip to Italy.
- Five Veterinary Science students are going to the America Association of Lab Animal Science QUAD Symposium in Connecticut meeting with Jessica Schiavo.
- Nine students and one faculty member participated in the 7th Study Abroad trip to South Africa in January.
- 11 students and five faculty/ staff members will return to WorldVets International Training program in Grenada, Nicaragua over the April break.
- Nine students and two faculty/staff from the Golf and Sports Turf Management programs were able to attend the Golf Industry Show (GIS) in San Antonio, TX. Students were exposed to the green industry, where they met alumni, industry leaders, and equipment sales reps which extends far beyond their educational career at Delhi. The Students also competed nationally in the Turf Bowl competition. Students Edgar Magana (senior) Andrew Wacendak, Mario Malagisi (juniors) and Jeremy Swift (freshmen) composed of the Turf Bowl Team that placed 12th out of 52 teams.
- Ryan Jeskie a senior in the Golf & Sports Turf BBA program is in the running for a USGA green section one week internship with the USGA. The annual USGA Green Section Internship Program provides students the opportunity to travel with the USGA Green Section staff during Course Consulting Service visits which brings knowledge/research results and practical information on construction/maintenance directly to golf course owners, managers, and golf course superintendents. The goal of the internship program is to provide students with a broad view of the golf industry and the opportunity to learn about golf course maintenance through the perspective of the USGA agronomists.
- Landscape and Design Management student Mariano Malagisi received the 2018 Belantoni Scholarship from the National Association of Landscape Professionals (NALP) in February. Scholarships are awarded to students who illustrate leadership skills, a passion for the green industry and prove themselves academically.
- Greenhouse Production students will be able to see and experience firsthand micro-propagation at Delhi's unique business PhytaCell Technology, LLC this spring. Owner Sally Scrimshaw provides the class a tour, demonstration and ability to try the process of dividing and cultivating the small plant specimens.
- The next Discover Delhi Day at Open House is scheduled for Saturday, April 21st and student registration has already passed the 200 mark. This day is projected to be our largest with both juniors and seniors in attendance.

- Access and Equity has a learning Coach that has been working with students in the afternoons on skills to be successful

- Tutorial Services offers peer tutoring, professional tutoring, faculty tutoring and all are both set up for individual and group tutoring as needed.
- Career Services has offered students the following presentations: Cover letter & resumes,
 Optimal Resume, Networking, Interviewing and Strategies for Employment. Career Services also
 worked with the Veterinary Science area to offer mock interviews for the students as they prepare
 for preceptorships and employment. Eighty six students attended with nine faculty and one staff
 member.
- There have been eight recruiters who have visited the campus: United States Air Force, Army, Navy, National Guard, Camp Winadu, ACCO and MDI (mechatronics employer), with a few more already beginning to schedule in the next two months.
- In the Academic Exploration Program (AEP) 25 students earned a 3.0 or better (31%), with 11 (14%) making the Dean's List.

Librarians have been meeting with faculty to explore OER options for their courses, and have also been working with campus instructional designers and technologists to make these resources available in Moodle. Carrie Fishner is the campus lead for this program. As of January 2018,

- Delhi had 17 course sections of OER offered with 851 students enrolled. Using the formula provided by SUNY, Delhi students have saved \$25,300 in textbook costs this academic year.

- The Golf in Schools program, where PGM faculty and students introduce the fundamentals of golf through Physical Education classes, is underway. Ten different schools in two counties take part in the program. PGM students get hands-on experience in teaching and also qualify for community service. This is also an opportunity to market our program and recruit students.
- Adriene Clifford continues as Treasurer and board member of Hanford Mills Museum. David Brower also serves as a board member and chairs the Fund Development and Marketing Committee.
- James Margiotta and students Dan Hess and Julia Gaffney participated in the annual Ice Harvest Festival at Hanford Mills Museum in February. The team carved three separate ice sculptures and interacted with attendees, explaining the fundamentals of sculpting.
- Adriene Clifford and Charles Mole continue to facilitate the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. Through this program, they supervise four students who are currently taking the income tax course and who have become IRS certified to be volunteers to assist lower income individuals with free tax preparation and filing. The students run this program for four hours each Saturday that college is in session, beginning in February.
- The Business Department continues their relationship with the Town of Walton. Student's video tape town meetings and upload the video to the website. As part of her independent study, this year's student gave a presentation to the board on ways to use social media and created a Town "Social Media Policy" for them.
- Lynne Smith bought Days for Girls to Campus in January. This humanitarian organization makes feminine hygiene packs for women in underdeveloped nations. In addition, the organization also promotes microenterprise among young women in these countries. More than 40 participants from the local community and the campus community were in attendance. This event went a

- long way towards increasing the community's acceptance of college students and assisted in raising the reputation of the college within our community. Richard Celli and Mathew Heath VanHorn assisted in off-campus advertising.
- Liz Santobuono is running a March Madness of Books program students/faculty/community can vote for children's books that have been pitted against each other in brackets at the library desk. The final bracket will take place the week of March 26. The library has collaborated with the College Bookstore to supply prizes.
- Advanced Landscape Design and Practices students, in the Horticulture Sciences area, are
 working with Delaware Academy on developing ideas for new foundation plantings at the high
 school. Mr. Bartlett, the school's grounds superintendent, provided guidance as to what the
 schools needs are. Students will prepare designs for the entry to the high school as well as
 recommendations for locations of future tree plantings on campus.

- Horticulture Faculty have entered into discussion about the possibility of offering an Introductory
 Horticulture class to students at Delaware Academy. The class could be offered starting fall
 2018.
- Utilizing the new Kubota ATV and accompanying groomer, students of the Service Learning class have been grooming cross country ski trails throughout the College Golf Course. Two trails of varying difficulty cover nearly four miles for college and community members alike.
- For the National Alliance of Concurrent Enrollment Partnerships (NACEP) accreditation, Glenda Roberts and Dawn Sohns have been hosting monthly meetings for the deans, program directors, and identified faculty liaisons for the Delhi Advantage College in High School program. These meetings are open sessions to address issues/concerns, answer questions, and share stories of the experiences the faculty liaisons are having. We plan to have these meetings at least once per month throughout the year.
- We are working on a summer Program Development Day for the high school instructors and
 other exciting initiatives to engage our faculty with the high school faculty. A poll will be
 distributed to both the high school faculty and the college liaison to determine the most
 appropriate times to host these programs.
- Students and faculty from the Restaurant Management and Operations course hosted a victory lunch for the members of the residential construction team who won their national competition.
- Nancy Winters nominated as Co-Chair of the FACT2 Task Force for Mixed Reality. Nancy also
 volunteers for a community family with multiple family members with mental illness providing
 services such as medication, financial, and medical management.
- On April 19, Career Service and the Alumni Association are working together to offer a
 networking event for our Architecture and Construction Management Students. Alumni will visit
 the college and offer our students experience and guidance for networking opportunities in their
 future.
- Jeff Stedman and Gabriella Vasta sit on the Behavioral Intervention Team (BIT) committee that connects our area with student life in discussions of concerning student behaviors. This allows for excellent communication between the areas and the ability to note students who are in need of contact.
- Scott Swayze is working with 1st Sgt. John Lehmann of the Delaware County Correctional Facility to translate their inmate handbook into Spanish.

- Lisa Heimbauer is maintaining her relationship with the ARC of Delaware, and she had one of their clients audit her PSYC100 course during the fall 2017 semester and PSYC215 during this spring 2018 semester.
- Chris Cormier was interviewed on the topic of drug addiction for the documentary,
 "WHACKED! Opiate Addiction in Rural America," produced and directed by Jessica Vecchione, and premiered in March 2018 at the Theater in Walton.
- Dan Davis interviewed Delaware Academy students for entry into the Fall 2018 cohort of the SUNY Delhi-DA CTEP program

- Gary Brackett is leading the collaborative effort between SUNY Delhi and Otsego County to build Tiny Homes to serve as temporary housing for the homeless.

Resource Development

- The PGM program's putting green in the swing lab has been upgraded to include a more realistic surface.
- Hospitality faculty and staff secured a \$1,800 in-kind donation from the American Culinary
 Federation to support student attendance at the ChefConnect: Charlotte conference in Charlotte,
 NC in February. While at the conference, students had an opportunity to experience traditional
 North Carolina barbecue and other cultural elements in addition to the conference.
- The library received \$6,851 through Baker & Taylor's Coordinated Collection Development award process, administered through the South Central Regional Library Council this year; this award will go towards the purchase of library resources.
- Golf and Plant Sciences was awarded a onetime \$500.00 Ancillary Funding request to add
 irrigation to a portion of the Farnsworth hall greenhouse complex. This is an upgrade to the
 facility that will show student industry standards as well as a mist and drip irrigation system. It
 will also give the plants the proper watering requirements on a regimented schedule that is best
 for the plants.
- Julia Ward secured a donation of a BIOSPHERE, which is an all in one eco-system terrarium equipped with a misting and lighting system from an alumni -Jeff Moskal who is currently a sales representative for OASE North America/GeoGlobal Partners LLC. This will be a nice addition for the department in showcasing a professional terrarium as well as a conversational piece at open houses, etc. Julia was also able to get a donation of 20- 32oz and 20- 64oz measuring cups for the department from Jason Woulfin at SQM North American Corp.
- The NRRS program was able to purchase a new tandem kayak. This kayak will be utilized specifically to deliver personalized programming for persons with disabilities.
- Career Services continues to utilize College Central Network (employer database) and Optimal Resume that supports both students and employers.
- Siemens continues to be a great supporter of our Mechatronics program, providing us with both software and hardware.
- Connections were made at MIA with Universal Robots that will enable us to purchase robots at a 50% discount with free software.
