On April 3, SUNY Delhi celebrated a historic milestone with the inauguration of Dr. Mary Bonderoff as its 11th president.

The ceremony, held at the Clark Field House, was a vibrant blend of tradition and personal flair, reflecting Dr. Bonderoff's unique leadership style.

Dr. Bonderoff's journey with SUNY began in 1988 as a Residence Hall Director at SUNY Delhi. Over the years, she held a number of leadership roles, including Vice President for Student Affairs and Chief Diversity Officer at SUNY Morrisville. In 2022, she returned to SUNY Delhi as interim president and was officially appointed as the college's 11th president in 2024.

The 2025 ceremony also featured a keynote address and the conferral of an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters to James "Jim" Palmiter, a 1981 hospitality alumnus turned entrepreneur. A graduate of SUNY Delhi's Hospitality and Restaurant Management program, Palmiter's journey took him from his rural, working-class background to a national stage as a highly regarded innovator, entrepreneur, and financial industry leader. Pivoting from his early hospitality career to the complex world of financial information services, Palmiter's determination, intelligence, and innovative mindset propelled him quickly into senior leadership roles in globally recognized companies.

"This moment means more to me than I can easily express. Because this isn't just a professional recognition—this is deeply personal. This is SUNY Delhi. This is where it all began for me. I still remember arriving at SUNY Delhi young, full of hope, and maybe a little uncertain. I didn't have all the answers, but I had ambition and a willingness to learn. Delhi took a chance on me. And that made all the difference."

May 17, 2025, SUNY Delhi held the 108th annual commencement on the college track under sunny skies.

Approximately 800 graduates received master's, bachelor's, and associate degrees and certificates at the ceremony.

SUNY Delhi President Dr. Mary Bonderoff delivered a welcome address telling graduates:



Alumni Awards Honors Exceptional Alumni and Staff

Each year the SUNY Delhi Alumni Association honors distinguished graduates, faculty, and staff for exceptional professional achievements, community service, and dedication to the college. The 2024 recipients were Hayley Murphy, Steven Whipple, Corin Zimmer, Barbara Sturdevant, and Robert Backus.



Dr. Hayley Murphy '84—Distinguished Alumna Award

Dr. Murphy was nominated for her trailblazing work and leadership in the field of veterinary science. As the executive director and CEO of the Detroit Zoological Society in Royal Oak, MI, Dr. Murphy is the first female in the society's 96-year history to serve in this role. Dr. Murphy is recognized as one of the nation's leading experts in gorilla cardiac health.



Steven Whipple '98—Distinguished Alumnus Award

Mr. Whipple was recognized for his for his unwavering advocacy for SUNY Delhi's academic programs, and excelling in his career in the golf course industry. Since 2003, Mr. Whipple has served as the Golf Program Manager and Golf Course Superintendent at the United States Military Academy at West Point. He has received many commendations from West Point, including the Commander's Award for Civilian Service.



Corin Zimmer '19—Alumnus of Merit Award

After earning a bachelor's degree in Business and Technology Management from SUNY Delhi, Mr. Zimmer joined Luck Grove, a Syracuse-based company specializing in telecom services for enterprise, government, and nonprofit clients nationwide. As Senior Vice President of Business Development, he has guided the company's meteoric rise.



Professor Emeritus Barbara Sturdevant—*Exemplary Service Award*

Prof. Sturdevant began her career at SUNY Delhi in 1991 as an assistant professor and advanced to the role of full professor and department chair of Delhi's business programs. During her 32 years at Delhi, she facilitated numerous student experiences and networking events, chaired the curriculum committee, and helped plan the NJCAA National Championship Basketball Tournament held at Delhi for many years. She was known for her dedication to her students, providing them with the guidance and expertise to achieve their career goals. Sturdevant received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 2005.



Robert 'Bob' Backus—Exemplary Service Award

Bob started his SUNY Delhi career as an adjunct instructor in 1992 and became an athletic coach in 1993. Credited with building a track and field dynasty at Delhi, his squads won 15 NJCAA National Championships in men's and women's track and field and cross country. Backus successfully oversaw Delhi's transition to NCAA Division III, elevating the college's athletic profile. Throughout his career at Delhi, he has tirelessly advocated for student-athletes and coined the well-known slogan, "It's a great day to be a Bronco!" Backus retired in 2024 after 31 years of dedicated service.

SUNY Delhi Ranks as Top 10 Public College

SUNY Delhi once again received high marks in the *U.S. News and World Report* publication of the Best Colleges for 2025. Delhi secured a spot as one of the Top 10 Public Schools in the Northeast. The ranking compares public colleges on academic quality, graduation and retention rates, resources for students and faculty, and other factors.

SUNY Delhi was also honored in the Top 10 in the following categories:

- Best Value School (10th place) for providing outstanding academic quality at an affordable cost
- **Best Colleges for Veterans** (8th place) for commitment to offering benefits and resources to veterans and active-duty service members

Neil Riddell Field A Lasting Legacy



SUNY Delhi officially announced the naming of the newest athletics facility on campus—Neil Riddell Field—at the launch of a successful men's and women's soccer season in September 2022. Neil Riddell Field has quickly become a signature addition to SUNY Delhi's NCAA Division III athletic facilities. The field is home to some of Delhi's most competitive teams, including women's soccer, men's soccer, and men's lacrosse. The facility brings modern amenities such as sports lighting, clocks, and a sound system to the athlete and fan experience.

"I'm proud to be in a place in my life to make a difference. When I came to Delhi, I didn't have two nickels to rub together," said Mr. Riddell. In his first semester at college Riddell hitchhiked back and forth to campus from Bloomville, NY. Through his participation in college athletics, fraternity life, and the close relationships he developed with faculty, Mr. Riddell found a supportive community at Delhi that helped him succeed.

After his graduation, Riddell served in the U.S. Army as a paratrooper and then found success in business—success he attributes to his Delhi education and to keeping a positive attitude, having a strong work ethic, choosing good friends, and keeping a smile on his face.

Referred to by some as "*Mr. Delhi*", Riddell is a member of the SUNY Delhi Athletics Hall of Fame, former Vice President of the College Foundation at Delhi, Inc. Board of trustees, and is the Foundation's longest serving trustee. He and his wife Linda '65 are constant fixtures at SUNY Delhi civic, academic, and athletic events. In addition to their major gift for Neil Riddell Field, Neil and Linda established the *Neil* '62 and Linda '65 Riddell Endowed Scholarship in the College Foundation at Delhi to support students in need.

ATHLETICS UPDATES



Cross Country

The Broncos continued their great tradition in cross country this fall with the women's team winning their final North Atlantic Conference Championship while the men placed third. The programs look to continue to raise the bar as they will now compete in the SUNYAC moving forward.

Track and Field

The indoor and outdoor track and field programs moved to the SUNYAC for improved competitive opportunities as of this winter and have responded with great performances. The men have seen one new individual program record and three new relay marks established. On the women's side, 14 individual records have fallen at the hands of six different individuals and four relay records have gone down.

Gol

The golf team had another great year, placing second in the North Atlantic Conference Championships and boasted the individual co-champion in Grady Glennon. The team spent the spring playing in some large invitationals and capped the spring season by entering two scoring squads at the Oswego Invitational where they placed first and third in the eight team field!

Volleyball

The volleyball team won the NAC West regular season title to earn the right to host the NAC West playoff semifinals for another year. The team went undefeated in NAC West divisional play on the season, going 6-0. The team lost a heartbreaker in the post season 3-2, but look to build another great season next year to work back to the conference title match again.

Tennis

Women's tennis made its return for the first time since the 2019 season and immediately earned a post season berth! Halle Bodo was named the North Atlantic Conference Rookie of the year for her efforts during the fall season. The men also earned a berth in the postseason tournament in the spring semester under new head coach Moises Saintil in his first season.

Men's Basketball

The men's basketball team was back on top of the North Atlantic Conference West Division again this year, earning the right to host the NAC Tournament quarterfinals and semifinals. The men won the quarterfinal game and fell in the NAC West Championship in a 68-65 loss.

Women's Basketball

The women's basketball program is on its way back. After a rough stretch that resulted in canceling the second half of the season in 2023-2024, coach Rasul Jackson put together a group to start the rebuild. Not only did they play the whole season, but they played their best basketball of the year at the end of the season. With a number of contributors returning and a solid group of recruits coming back, the Delhi women's basketball team is very excited for 2025-2026.

Swimming and Diving

Swimming and Diving is another program on the rise. After some years of low numbers, things saw a change for the positive this year with numbers, and performances, improving. The program now welcomes back Coach K to lead the program again and begin the work of building the program further.

Lacrosse

The lacrosse team had a great spring and earned the number two seed in the North Atlantic Conference (NAC) playoffs, finishing the season with a hard fought 14-12 loss in the NAC championship. Delhi notched a final record of 11-5, the second double digit win season in a row.

Softball

The softball team returned to the NAC playoffs this season following a four-year drought. Over the course of the season unpredictable weather caused a number of game cancellations that resulted in a shortened schedule. The Broncos finished the season 7-5 in conference play and 14-18 overall. Sophomore Angelina Dickel recorded the first no-hitter in program history.

SUNY Delhi joins Alfred State and SUNY Cobleskill as full members beginning fall 2026. "SUNY Delhi is honored to be accepted into the SUNYAC. This marks an exciting new chapter for our athletic department and reflects the hard work and dedication of our student-athletes, coaches and staff. More importantly, it gives us a forever home for our programs," said Director of Athletics Robb Munro. The expanded SUNYAC, which will comprise 25 member institutions is a highly competitive conference for NCAA III athletics.

The Student Life division oversees critical programs and services including athletics, the center for student leadership, health and counseling, residential life, and university police.

Mr. Michael O'Donnell appointed Chief of University Police. O'Donnell joined the SUNY Delhi community as lieutenant in 2020. He has over 24 years of law enforcement experience, including serving as interim assistant chief at SUNY Oneonta.

SUNY Delhi Receives Major Gift to Support Construction Management

Anonymous Grant Expands Spay and Neuter Servicesfor Community

SUNY Delhi's Veterinary Technology program received a major anonymous gift to expand its small animal spay and neuter services. The \$215,000 gift helps to establish a new community-facing animal clinic in Farnsworth Hall that will serve humane societies, animal clinics, and the community.

Thanks to this gift, spay and neuter services to the community are expected to increase by more than 200%—with up to 400 spay and neuter procedures performed per year.

"This tremendous gift comes at the perfect time for our program," said Michael Sullivan, Vice President for College Advancement. "Our faculty and students are excited to create a new signature addition to enhance our renowned veterinary technology program," said Dr. Bret Meckel, Dean of the School of Veterinary and Applied Sciences at SUNY Delhi.

Farnsworth Hall Renovations Complete



On September 6, 2024, the campus community celebrated the re-opening of Farnsworth Hall after more than two years and over \$35 million in renovations. SUNY Chancellor John B. King, Jr., Assemblyman Chris Tague, and members of the SUNY Construction Fund were among distinguished guests to mark the occasion with a ribbon-cutting and re-dedication ceremony.

The newly transformed building boasts stateof-the-art veterinary science labs, surgical and diagnostic imaging suites, a community-facing small animal health clinic, and classrooms with infrastructure that supports technology, student collaboration, and multi-use needs.

College Foundation Elects New Leadership
